John E. (Jed) Kuhn MD, MS is the Kenneth D. Schermerhorn Professor (with tenure) of orthopaedic surgery, Chief of the Division of Sports Medicine, and Interim Chair of the Department of Orthopaedics at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. He completed Medical School and Orthopaedic Residency at the University of Michigan, completed a fellowship in Sports Medicine and Shoulder Surgery at the Steadman Hawkins Clinic, then returned to the University of Michigan where he served as faculty from 1994-2003. He was recruited to Vanderbilt University to help build the Sports Medicine Division. His clinical practice and research involve conditions of the shoulder. W.Z. (Buz) Burkhead, MD- A graduate of Southern Methodist University, Dr. W. Z. (Buz) Burkhead joined the W. B. Carrell Clinic™ in 1983. surgeons over the last 26 years. The Fellows are funded by the WB Carrell shoulder and Elbow Foundation.

The father of three, Dr. Burkhead is the lead singer and founder of the all-doctor rock band Doctor. The band continues to play for charitable benefits.
